Philemon 10-12—Paul's advocacy for Onesimus

Paul's lovingkindness with Philemon, v.10

- I. It's difficult for us to fully appreciate how Paul's request would've struck Philemon. In a sense, we're desensitized to the shock factor in what Paul asks.
 - A. Yet, we're not totally in the dark. We've seen how careful and purposed Paul's been in approaching the matter; so we can tell he knows how hard this will be for Philemon.
 - B. This is why Paul structured v.10 as he did. It's the most critical verse in the letter as Paul finally mentions "the offensive name." Putting it *last* in the sentence (in the Greek), we can see how careful Paul is to prepare Philemon's heart to hear it.
- II. Before introducing the name of the person for whom he's advocating, Paul says 3 things about him–all meant to let Philemon know that this person is *very dear to Paul*.
 - A. He calls him his child.
 - 1. This alerts Philemon that Paul's advocating, not for himself, but for another. This would've warmed his heart because it evidences a Christlike selflessness.
 - B. He calls himself his father.
 - 1. The word used actually means "whom I have begotten," by which Paul is saying the person is a convert of his—just as Philemon was (cf. v.19).
 - C. He says he fathered him in his imprisonment.
 - 1. The person is a sweet fruit of his sufferings for Christ.
 - D. And then at last, he names him: *Onesimus*.
- III. This is a powerful lesson in the **welcome** we should give to those whom God's pleased to bring into the family. The example of Christ and the gospel of Christ call us to wrap our arms around all those around whom Christ has wrapped His arms–regardless of their past.
 - A. If Christ loves them, if God the Father accepts them, and if the Spirit indwells them, then they're our brethren and we should love and welcome them as well.

The gospel's transformation of Onesimus, v.11

- I. Paul admits the indictment Philemon has against Onesimus and makes no attempt to mitigate the condemnation due him for his past worthlessness and transgressions.
 - A. This showed Philemon that Paul hadn't been fooled by a "tall tale" but that Onesimus had confessed to Paul the

- whole truth of his sinful past. Paul knows what he did and how black his past was.
- B. But with a tactful play on Onesimus' name (which means *profitable* or *useful*) he quickly assures Philemon that he'll find the formerly inappropriate name to be most appropriate now.
- C. Paul vouches for his repentance and conversion and says they'll be borne out in practice—to Philemon's benefit and joy.
- II. This is a great testimony to the transforming power of the gospel of Jesus Christ.
 - A. Christianity knows nothing of hopeless cases and nothing of despair. It can elevate the lowest and transform the worst, 1Tim 1.15-16
 - B. Consider Onesimus' story from Early Church History...
 - C. Never give up on anyone. As long as there is breath there is hope—hope for conversion of the lost and hope for sanctification of the redeemed.
- III. This is also a testimony to the fact that only in Christ do we find ourselves. We finally become who we were created to be when God calls us His child. We were all Onesimuses; but when Christ called us and made us children of God, in Him we finally found our identity. Do you know who you are? Is your identity in Christ?

Paul's love for Onesimus, v.12

- I. Onesimus was a piece of Paul's very heart. This good-fornothing runaway slave had become so dear to Paul that to part with him was like parting with his own heart. —We can only imagine what a powerful plea these words would've been with one who loved Paul as much as Philemon did.
- II. Paul's advocacy for Onesimus is a beautiful testimony to the advocacy of Jesus for us. We are all Christ's Onesimuses and He pleads for us before the Father.
 - A. But unlike Philemon, whose heart grace had to turn towards Onesimus, the Father's heart is already turned towards us (Jn 3.16). Therefore Christ's advocacy for us is not only most welcome but also most effective (cf. Jn 17; 1Jn 2.1-2).
 - B. Is Christ interceding for you? Have you placed your hope in His representation and advocacy? If not, see that you do it today, Mt 11.28-29; 1Tim 2.5; Acts 4.12
