God's overruling providence in human events

- I. V.15 begins with the word *For*. This shows that this 3d argument is another reason why Paul set aside his wish to keep Onesimus and instead willed to send him back, viz., because God seems to have had Philemon's interest in mind when He permitted the flight of Onesimus.
- II. See how charitably Paul speaks about Onesimus' flight from Philemon: he was parted from you.
 - A. He could've simply said "he ran away;" but he speaks of it euphemistically—not because his sin was small, but because his repentance was great.
 - B. **Lesson**: when a person's repented of his sin and God's forgiven him we shouldn't aggravate it by speaking of it harshly. Instead we should speak of it graciously–just as God does with us. Compare 2Sam 12.9-10 with 1Kgs 15.5
 - 1. When calling people to repentance, we need to paint with a black brush; but afterwards, we should never speak of it as if it's not under the blood of Christ or forgiven by God.
- III. But there's more behind this phrase. The verb Paul uses is *passive* (i.e. he *was parted*). That means behind Onesimus' willful flight was another will at work—even God's will; and it's to God's will that Paul's directing Philemon's attention.
 - A. Onesimus *sinned* in what he did, but God *overruled* it by His wise providence for His glory. Thus while God is not the author of sin, He is the sovereign orderer of it. And He ordered that Onesimus' sin would result in Onesimus' conversion, cf. Gen 50.20; Acts 2.23; 4.27-28.
 - B. **Lesson**: God not only rules over the sins of men, but overrules them in the infallible accomplishment of His holy will.
 - 1. Nothing can mitigate sin. But despite what sin is, God is pleased to permit it as a lever in His providence, utilizing it to bring about the very opposite of what sinners intend by it. E.g. the crucifixion of Christ.
 - 2. Thus, by a merciful providence, God infallibly guides His people in the course and to the ends which He's chosen for them, wisely using their decisions and blamelessly using their sins to bring it all about.
 - C. *However*, while this is the manner of God's providence it's not the manner of our lives. We may not sin that good may come. It's God prerogative alone to use sin to bring about good, and He does this holily, blamelessly, and wisely.
- IV. Paul says God overruled Onesimus' sin to work it for good. The *good* God brought out of this is highlighted by two things:
 - A. The contrast between how short Onesimus was gone and how long Philemon now has him back (an hour vs. forever). Thus, Philemon's loss is incomparable with his gain.

- B. The contrast between having Onesimus back as a bondservant and having Onesimus back as a brother.
 - 1. God made the relationship between them more and better than it ever was. He made the *slave* a *brother*. Onesimus is now more of a blessing than he ever was to Philemon.
 - 2. N.B. By these words Paul planted the seeds of our brotherhood which eventually abolished slavery.
- C. **Lesson**: God not only sovereignly overrules evil and sin for His glory, but he mercifully orders it all to bring about the good He wills for us, cf. Rom 8.28.
- V. Paul's wise use of the word *Perhaps*.
 - A. If there's one thing we can be sure of, it's that we can't be sure of our interpretation of the ways of God's providence.
 - 1. The ways of God are mysterious and His ultimate purpose behind them is simply out of our view, Dt 29.29.
 - B. It's rash, then, to speak with certainty about God's ways. The wisest thing to say is, "*Perhaps* this is why that happened."
 - C. But this *uncertainty* is beautiful because while it confesses our ignorance of God's ultimate purpose, it also confesses our dependence and trust in the wisdom and goodness of God's ultimate purpose.
 - 1. Thus the *perhaps* of the believer is an undying hope because it leaves God to be God and trusts God to be good in all that He does. Therefore, behind the Christian's perhaps is an absolute certainty—not in the events but in his God.

Inferences

- I. If God's able to bring good out of evil then we have no reason to fear the injuries of men or the devil. Whatever happens, God will bring it about for our good, Ps 27.1-3
- II. If God turns temporal losses into eternal gains then consider how that should affect how you respond to your trials, cf. 2Cor 4.17-18. This calls for patience, contentment, and trust.
- III. If your God is a God of providence then consider how you should look at all the events of your life. *Every* event has a *good* purpose—whether you can trace it or not.
- IV. If God alone sees the end from the beginning and if God alone is at the helm to bring that end about then consider the wisdom of saying: *Perhaps*. It's foolish to speak as though we can mine the depths of God's unsearchable wisdom, Rom 11.33-34
- V. If God has a purpose for all things and sits safely at the helm in all circumstances then we should be ashamed of the many times we looked at our circumstances in unbelief and despair. We have a God we can trust and it is safe to trust Him always.
