Philemon 8-9—Paul's loving approach

He might have commanded

- I. Paul was an apostle invested with the authority of Christ, Acts 9.15; Gal 1.1; Eph 1.1
 - A. He could speak on Christ's behalf, declare the will of God to the churches, and command righteousness in the name of Christ, 1Cor 5.3-5; 7.10-12; 14.37; Lk 10.16
 - B. But his apostleship is not something Paul insists upon in this letter, cf. v.1. His mention of it here is only to make clear that while he knows he has the right "in Christ" to command, he refused to exercise it.
 - C. There are two reasons, then, why Paul might have commanded Philemon, v.8
 - 1. Because he had the lawful authority to
 - 2. Because what he's requesting is a thing "required;" i.e. it's a matter of righteousness before God, cf. Lk 17.4; Mt 6.15
 - D. Yet, where Paul might have commanded, he didn't. Why? For the sake of love, v.9 (cf. vv.4-7)
- II. Lesson: we don't always have to stand upon our authority.
 - A. Many people, especially men, love to stand upon their authority; not so much because they should, but because they can–and primarily because they're afraid of losing it.
 - 1. The result is a government in which they rule the bodies but not the hearts. Theirs is an authority that's obeyed and yet despised and hated.
 - 2. They never learn just how powerful gentleness and love are in the hands of a ruler because they hide behind their authority in fear.
 - B. Paul appealed to Philemon because he sought not so much to move Philemon as to see Philemon move himself.
 - 1. Paul knew that nothing was so strong as love and nothing so persuasive as a loving government.
 - C. This is a great lesson for all stations. We should all set our conduct by this pattern and let the law of love ever sit upon our lips. Harsh authority is the weapon of a weak man whereas love is the weapon of a strong man.
 - 1. If all you want is outward conformity, then imposing your will might work; but if you're after oneness of will and the joyful inclination of the heart, that can only be gained by a loving authority.

He preferred to appeal

- I. Paul lays out two motives in support of his appeal
 - A. He asks Philemon to consider that this request is coming from an old man.
 - 1. This reminds us that honor and deference should be given to our aged saints. They've seen more battles than we have and learned more of the strength of the flesh and the power of the Spirit to overcome it than we have. And they've learned things the hard way and can teach us a better way–if we'll listen.
 - 2. Paul's appeal reminds us that in the church of God, the elderly should be appreciated and respected by the youth and not marginalized to make way for the youth.]
 - B. He asks Philemon to consider that this request is coming from a prisoner for Christ Jesus. By these two motives Paul seeks to kindly reinforce the duty which is binding upon Philemon before God.
 - C. This is a model of loving leadership patterned after the Lord's loving approach to us, Mt 11.29-30
 - 1. Understand how lovingly the Lord approaches us with His Law. Outside of Christ the Law is cold and hard; but in and from Christ it comes to us covered with His blood and sealed with His love as He says to us, "Will you do all these things for My sake?"
 - 2. And we cannot resist Him, because we love Him, 1Jn 4.19; Jn 14.15
 - D. Lesson: it's from this gentle and loving manner in which Christ has treated us that we learn how to treat one another.
 - 1. Some may need rough imperatives backed by force, but loving gentleness should always be tried first.
 - 2. We're to rule in so loving a manner that submission to us will be the easiest thing in the world; and that means we must learn when to yield our authority and how to show our strength by stooping in love to those under us.
