1 Thessalonians 5:23, 24

Our Sure Sanctification

Proposition: *God alone fully and finally saves his saints.*

I. The Grounds of Sanctification (v. 23a)

- a. Sanctification is Not of Ourselves.
 - i. We have no *peace* of ourselves. (Ro. 7:21-23)
 - 1. When we labor, we are internally *conflicted with the law of sin*.
 - 2. When we sin, we are internally accused with the Law of God.
 - ii. We have no *perfection* of ourselves. (1 Ch. 29:15; Lk. 17:10)
 - 1. Our selves and best works easily fall apart. (Is. 26:12)
 - 2. Our selves and best works are alloyed with sin. (Is. 64:6)
- b. Sanctification is of the God of Peace.
 - i. Christ alone is our peace. (Ep. 2:14)
 - 1. Christ on the cross saved us from penalty of God's Law.
 - 2. Christ on the throne will save us from the reign of sin.
 - ii. Christ alone perfects us. (Ps. 138:9; Ph. 1:6)
 - 1. Christ's work endures forever.
 - 2. Christ's work is pure in holiness.
- c. Conclusion: We depend on God for our full and final sanctification.

II. The Promise of Sanctification (vv. 23b, 24)

- a. The What of Sanctification:
 - i. We will receive a *complete and blameless soul*. (Ezk. 37:22-24)
 - 1. Sin and its temptations will be uprooted forever.
 - 2. Glorious Christlikeness will be established forever.
 - ii. We will receive an *entire and faultless body*. (Jb. 19:25-27; 1 Co. 15:53)
 - 1. Our frail, mortal bodies will be raised into solid immortality.
 - 2. Our constant pain and fatigue will transfigure into everlasting pleasure and vigor.
- b. The When of Sanctification:
 - i. Not in this life, but at the end. (1 Co. 1:7-9)
 - 1. God preserves us despite our ongoing struggle with sin.
 - 2. God preserves us because of the certainty of his coming.
 - ii. At the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. (2 Thess. 1:7, 10)
 - 1. Christ revealed from heaven will conquer our enemies without.
 - 2. Christ revealed in his saints will conquer our enemies within.
- c. The Why of Sanctification:
 - God himself has called us to peace. (Hb. 7:25)
 - 1. God calls us to peace with himself in Christ. (Ro. 5:1)

- 2. God calls us to *peace in our hearts* through Christ. (Co. 3:15)
- ii. God is faithful to his promise. (Hb. 6:17-20)
 - 1. God is faithful to his promises to Christ. (Ps. 16:10; Jn. 22:2)
 - 2. God is faithful to his promises to us. (Ps. 34:14; La. 3:31)
- d. Conclusion: God has promised our full and final sanctification.

III. Concluding Applications

- a. First, remember that you depend on God to sanctify you.
 - i. Your best works *cannot give the peace of conscience* that only God himself gives. Your furthest progress in faith *cannot bring you over the finish line of perfection*.
 - ii. Therefore, since our strength is so easily spent and our consciences so easily bruised, *let us render up our hearts and bodies to God* daily as we depend on God alone to finish the work he began:
 - 1. by keeping ourselves in the Word and meditative prayer;
 - 2. by watching eagerly for his glorious coming; and
 - 3. by laboring not to appease conscience, but to be like Christ.
- b. Second, rest assured that God is faithful to sanctify you.
 - i. Your worst sins *cannot annul God's promise* to sanctify you completely, body and soul. Your slow progress in faith *does not change Christ's intention to sanctify you completely.*
 - ii. Therefore, since we have such a strong and faithful God who endeavors all for our good and his glory, *let's praise and thank him* day by day for his faithfulness to all whom he calls:
 - 1. for keeping us until he returns;
 - 2. for the promise of his glorious appearing from heaven, in us; and
 - 3. for the hope of full and final sanctification in Christ.
